
As an adjacent neighbor to the Kirkman's proposed home, I'm in favor of their project but would like to assure that the windmills planned for the site will not be visible from my lots. I would suggest that any windmills be installed below the lowest grade of the proposed home, on the north side of the property. About 75% of the wind in that area comes from the north and would still be captured by the windmills in this location. Conversely, there is also turbine technology for wind capture that could be a more aesthetic, low-profile alternative. My primary concerns are the visual and potential noise impacts of the proposed windmills.
