RESOLUTION OF THE POLICY COUNCIL ON CHILDREN AND YOUTH/ CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION COUNCIL AUTHORIZING REMOTE TELECONFERENCE MEETINGS OF THE LEGISLATIVE BODIES OF THE POLICY COUNCIL ON CHILDREN AND YOUTH/ CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION COUNCIL PURSUANT TO THE RALPH M. BROWN ACT

WHEREAS, all meetings of the **POLICY COUNCIL ON CHILDREN AND YOUTH/ CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION COUNCIL** and its legislative bodies are open and public, as required by the Ralph M. Brown Act (Cal. Gov. Code §§ 54950 – 54963), so that any member of the public may attend, participate, and view the legislative bodies conduct their business; and

WHEREAS, the Brown Act, Government Code section 54953(e), makes provisions for remote teleconferencing participation in meetings by members of a legislative body, without compliance with the requirements of Government Code section 54953(b)(3), subject to the existence of certain conditions; and

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, Governor Newsom issued a Proclamation of a State of Emergency declaring a state of emergency exists due to the outbreak of respiratory illness due to a novel coronavirus (a disease now known as COVID-19), pursuant to the California Emergency Services Act (Government Code section 8625) and that State of Emergency is still in effect in the State of California; and,

WHEREAS, as of the date of this Resolution, neither the Governor nor the state Legislature have exercised their respective powers pursuant to Government Code section 8629 to lift the state of emergency either by proclamation or by concurrent resolution the state Legislature; and,

WHEREAS, the California Department of Industrial Relations has issued regulations related to COVID-19 Prevention for employees and places of employment. Title 8 of the California Code of Regulations, Section 3205(c)(5)(D) specifically recommends physical (social) distancing as one of the measures to decrease the spread of COVID-19 based on the fact that particles containing the virus can travel more than six feet, especially indoors; and,

WHEREAS, the Mendocino County Public Health Officer continues to recommend teleconferencing during public meetings of all legislative bodies to protect the community's health against the spread of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, the **POLICY COUNCIL ON CHILDREN AND YOUTH/ CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION COUNCIL** finds that state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing based on the Mendocino County Public Health Officer recommendation and the California Department of Industrial Relations' issuance of regulations related to COVID-19 Prevention through Title 8 of the California Code of Regulations, Section 3205(c)(5)(D); and,

WHEREAS, as a consequence, the **POLICY COUNCIL ON CHILDREN AND YOUTH/ CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION COUNCIL** does hereby find that current conditions meet the circumstances set for in Government Code section 54953(e)(3) to allow this legislative body to conduct its meetings by teleconferencing without compliance with Government Code section 54953 (b)(3), pursuant to Section 54953(e), and that such legislative body shall comply with the requirements to provide the public with access to the meetings as prescribed by Government Code section 54953(e)(2) to ensure the public can safely participate in and observe local government meetings.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE **POLICY COUNCIL ON CHILDREN AND YOUTH/ CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION COUNCIL**, as follows:

<u>Section 1</u>. <u>Recitals</u>. All of the above recitals are true and correct and are incorporated into this Resolution by this reference.

Section 2. Current Conditions Authorize Teleconference Public Meetings of Legislative

Bodies. Based on the California Governor's continued declaration of a State of Emergency, the
Mendocino County Public Health Officer's recommendation to continue teleconferencing, and
the regulations issued by the California Department of Industrial Relations, the POLICY
COUNCIL ON CHILDREN AND YOUTH/ CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION COUNCIL finds that
the conditions continue to exist pursuant to Government Code section 54953(e)(3) to allow
legislative bodies to use teleconferencing to hold public meetings in accordance with
Government Code section 54953(e)(2) to ensure members of the public have continued access
to safely observe and participate in local government meetings.

Section 3. Remote Teleconference Meetings. The POLICY COUNCIL ON CHILDREN AND YOUTH/ CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION COUNCIL is hereby authorized to take all actions necessary to carry out the intent and purpose of this Resolution including, conducting open and public meetings in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e)(2) and other applicable provisions of the Brown Act.

Dear PCCY Committee,

We are writing to request a \$3,000 grant to support the 2023 salary of our Education and Training Director (ETD), Amanda Rosenberg Gutierez, as she runs programming that helps to prevent child abuse and empowers youth to discover their innate ability to be creative, responsible, and compassionate individuals through training in dance, theatre, music and cultural education.

Families in Mendocino County are extremely stressed: almost half of marriages end in divorce; 75% of UUSD students are living below the federal poverty line; depression affects an estimated 1 in 8 teens; technology has replaced much of human interaction; and middle and low-income families are struggling just to maintain their standard of living. The ubiquitous drug culture and the economic struggles of Mendocino County families impact children greatly as reflected in our County's rate of child abuse, which, at 20/1,000 is more than twice the statewide rate of 9.4/1,000. SPACE is equipped to respond to these alarming issues. The programs offered through SPACE—in terms of the curriculum and the content of productions—help to prevent child abuse by supporting positive childhood experiences that help to increase resiliency in local youth and families.

The work of our ETD greatly increases our capacity to serve the community by expanding our educational programming as well as our intern training program. The ETD is responsible for training instructors on the "Building Emotional Understanding through the Arts" (BEUTA) Method, which embodies the philosophy of joyful and rigorous learning as well as the the importance of teamwork and respect for others. These effective teaching techniques, developed and tested over 30 years, equips professional artists with the tools they need to engage and motivate students of all abilities. As students grow their skills as dancers, actors, singers, and performers, they also develop creativity, gain confidence, learn to express their ideas through movement, and collaborate with peers. The joy, agency, and feeling of accomplishment that children experience in SPACE carries over into all aspects of their lives and helps to support thriving and interconnected families. The ETD works closely with our Latino Program Director, Ignacio Ayala, to engage the Latino community in our programming. For background, SPACE's enrollment is approximately 50% low-income and Latino.

SPACE's programming helps to prevent child abuse by serving as an antidote to many of the adverse childhood experiences that our youth face every day and we are committed to serving as an essential resource to Ukiah's families for generations to come. Countless parents and guardians have thanked us through the years for modeling working respectfully and non-violently with children. As one dad said, "SPACE has helped me to be a much better parent, just by observing how the SPACE teachers worked with my son."

Thank you so much for your time and consideration of our request.
