

EVERSON/BANK OF COMMERCE 45140 Main Street

7/23/1867, Deeds, Bk 3, pg 59, W. H. Kelly sold the northerly 35' x 80' of this parcel to James Flanagan. However, Heeser's map of 1868, indicated the entire parcel, 40' on Main St by 162.75' deep was owned by Abram Everson, Lot #18, Blk 2.

This building was surveyed for the State Office of Historic Preservation by the writer in 1987, with info available at that time.

The building had to have been built by Everson following the big fire of 1870, which wiped out west Main Street.

August 12, 1893, A. Brilliant opened a general merchandise store in the old Everson building on Main Street, erected soon after the 1870 fire.


Prior to 1905, the two Mendocino Banks, Mendocino Discount Bank and Mendocino Bank of Commerce were housed in the Heeser's Beacon building.

In 1905, Fred Stickney and Joshua Grindle organized the Mendocino Bank of Commerce as a successor to Grindle & Stickney, brokers, and the bank occupied this building. The Bank of America building on the corner of Kasten & Main Sts (119-237-10) was built in 1908.



Consider God's Warnings

EDITOR — Many thanks to Linn Bottorf for responding to my letter regarding God's Word and the promotion of the homosexual lifestyle during the July 4th parade.
